Ranger Service Changes

Peter Miller, Ranger at Dibbinsdale since 1998, is leaving the service after 37 years with the Council. He has been offered Early Voluntary Retirement and his last official working day is 31st December. The Council has sought to reduce staffing costs in an attempt to manage in this financial situation.

Vicky Hose, Senior Ranger of South Wirral is also leaving on this date. Taking over from Peter is Alan Smail who is at present the Ranger at Eastham. Taking over from Vicky is James Locke who has been working as Senior Ranger at Wirral Country Park, Thurstaston. It is hoped that South Wirral Ranger Service will be business as usual, although with one member of staff down there will obviously be less cover.

We wish to express our thanks to Vicky and Peter who are leaving and hope they are happy in what they seek to do in the future. James and Alan are warmly welcomed and I'm they can count on our support.

Local Government Changes

With staff of parks and open spaces leaving through the whole Council there will inevitably be a period of change. The Head of parks, Dave Cowling, and Malcolm Ingham, Head Ranger, are also leaving. This situation will remain until the end of the year while planning to do with the service being put out to contract takes place. Dave Green, Head of Technical Services,

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and in overall charge of the whole Department, is leading a process of seeking to contract out to private business the whole of the Ranger Service. When this takes place is dependant on a contractor being in place and an agreeable contract being struck. The definition of what the contractor is asked to do in the contract is one that will determine the quality of the service. Dave Green has a timetable of 12 to 18 months before the hand over takes place.

The remaining ranger staff will be guaranteed employment in any transfer to a private company. At this stage, there are no contract proposals on the table. How the consultation process develops will establish this into the New Year. It is hoped that The Friends of Dibbinsdale will be part of that consultation when it comes.

Profile of our new Ranger

Alan Smail has lived in Bebington for most of his working life. He has a wife and two teenage children. Alan has recently had a career change before becoming a ranger and once ran his own printing company. Alan went to what was once Bromborough Secondary School in Acre Lane. He was a school mate of Ian Hughes who was the ranger here before Peter. Alan has taken qualifications in Countryside Management at Reaseheath College from where he has recently graduated. Whilst at college, Alan worked on a placement here at the reserve with Peter. He became a seasonal ranger and then was appointed full time ranger at Eastham Country Park where he has been for more than two years. In this time, Alan has had an extensive working knowledge of the reserve, working side by side with Peter on a range of nature conservation tasks. Alan has a wide knowledge and interest in conservation. Recently he has undertaken surveys of the bat population in the reserve for example.

Pond management over the years has addressed issues from deoxygenation of the water to creating pond islands for the ducks




Tree Planting and arboretum
